

Based on feedback during the pilot training and pilot test, a frequently asked questions (FAQ) sheet for surveyor use will be developed as part of the survey training. The FAQ sheet will include answers to questions such as the following:

- When people stop part way through survey, how much is enough to get the \$10 card?
- Why are we doing this survey?
- What is EPA?
- When is it safe to fish?
- Why do we need to know language and ethnicity information?
- Why are we asking for zip code and neighborhood information?
- Why do we want to know information about sources of information?
